#### Great Fire of London



dangerous falls and finding ladders for quick escapes. The game brought out our competitive fires – maybe a little too much at times! After that, the whole of KS2 were treated to an assembly/show from the Kernow King and friends, which was in one word explosive! Thanks so much to Ed and co. for the exciting afternoon. It was interesting to learn new facts about Cornwall's history and mining in general.



## Pennoweth



### Art Workshops

This term, we invited Krowji-based artist, Claire Stockings-Baker to come into our school and run printing workshops with our Year 1 and 2 children. What an incredible day it was, spent in our brand-new Creative Lab!

The children were firstly shown vibrant Autumnal images of local landscapes and were invited to think of contrast colours to achieve the most striking effects.

Claire demonstrated how to use the rollers on gelli plates to create a print, and how to layer colour and texture to achieve an interesting and vibrant effect. The children then chose their colours and used the rollers to blend their background colour. Next, they explored different natural materials, such as, striped material, bottle top, cork, bubble wrap and a flower stencil to add texture to their background. Once they had achieved their background, they were then invited to choose a pre-cut Perspex stencil, such as a fox, pumpkin, leaf, toadstool or badger to place on top. They used black acrylic paint to dab quickly but gently to form a silhouette. Once they were happy with the effect, they carefully lifted off the stencil. It was wonderful to hear the shrieks of delight and 'wows' throughout the day. At the beginning of one of the workshops, a child with limited use of their hand, looked with uncertainty at what lay ahead saying, "I think this is going to be really hard." However, he absolutely loved learning new techniques, and the expression on his face was unforgettable when saw what he had achieved independently. Here were some of the most beautiful prints of the day.



Our Nursery children also enjoyed meeting a 'real artist' and had the opportunity to visit the Creative Lab during the day to see some of the work that had been created.

## Garras



### Remembrance

On Friday 10<sup>th</sup> November, the children, and staff of Garras School paid their annual tribute to the servicemen and women who lost their lives in the two World Wars and other conflicts around the world.

Originally, the day commemorated Armistice Day and the end of the First World War but has subsequently become a memorial for all those who have lost their lives in any conflict.

We gathered at the Mawgan War Memorial, where, at 11am, Mr Sturges played the last post and Mr Davidson, a former school governor, read an extract from 'The Fallen', by Laurence Binyon.

***"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning. We will remember them".***

The children and staff then shared a two-minute silence before returning to school.




We were even more pleased that Oliver in Year 6 was awarded player of the Tournament!

We can't wait to start our Netball club after Christmas and who knows, with a bit of practice, we come back even better!




## Portreath



### Primary Science Quality Mark




## Shared services team news roundup

### Shared Services and Operations Update



As you can see from the articles from the Shared Services Teams the last three months have been a busy period. Therefore, I would like to publicly thank all those people who often work tirelessly behind the scenes for their hard work over the last quarter.

Over the next three months we will continue to invest in the school estate, with plans afoot to make significant improvements at Godolphin and Portreath. We are also looking at how we can make best use of the kitchens across the Trust and in turn how the Trust can make sensible investments in these essential spaces. The rolling plan to ensure ICT equipment remains up to date will continue. The team is also working to ensure the network structures are robust to cope with the ever-increasing demands made on them. The Finance Team are continuing to embed the new finance software and will now start to focus on some of the peripheral systems to make sure they are appropriate for the larger organisation. The Business and Procurement team have been focussing on improving the Trusts environmental impact across all areas.

Thank you for your continuing support and the kind messages we often get, I know these are very much appreciated.

### Finance



#### Finance Update

The new Access Finance software went live on the 1st September and to date is working well. Both staff in the Shared Services Team and Administrators at schools all received training and now have access to various training manuals, both written and video. All these training aids can be accessed via the new software, but school staff are also reminded that if they need assistance they can always call the Finance Team who are there to help. During the last three months we have had visits from both Internal and External Auditors. Although the Internal Audit highlighted a number of areas that need to be improved, the findings were expected and measures were already in place to address the concerns raised, this work will continue of the next three months. We recently received feedback from the External Auditors who once again gave the Trust a clean bill of health, with only minor points to address. For anyone who is interested (and I know these people are few and far between) the latest accounts will be published on the Trusts website just before Christmas. They make excellent bedtime reading.



## IT across Crofty



This Term has seen the addition of 2 further schools into the Crofty Microsoft Cloud system. This means that all 16 schools teacher accounts, devices and files are stored within a single Teams based system. This project has taken 2 years to be completed. We will be looking at rearranging our Google Shared Drives into Microsoft Teams over the Spring Term so all files are available in a single system for easier access for all.



Across the last academic year the IT Team have purchased and configured the following devices to support the cloud move and improve the age of the equipment we are using:

- 150+ staff laptops
- 20 Interactive screens for classrooms
- 5 large Interactive screens for school halls
- 100+ Chromebooks for pupils
- 150+ iPads for staff and pupils
- New networking equipment at 6 schools including a £80,000 investment from the DfE Connect the Classroom scheme.

In the Spring term we will be focussing on purchasing further equipment for Teaching walls and pupil devices including iPads and Chromebooks. We will be finishing a print tender that will bring new printers to 7 schools that will increase reliability whilst costing the schools less money per page.

We will be aiming to come out to schools more in the Spring Term now that the cloud move is finished to give additional staff training. ## Business and Procurement



### Trust Sustainability

This year one of the top focusses of the Trust is to become more sustainable.



The Trust Eco Council have been working towards the goals and pledges set by the pupils at last year's Trust summit.

There are already some exciting things happening across all the schools, including an initiative this term to ensure that everyone has a refillable drinking bottle in school to reduce plastic bottles.

The children have also been given some stickers to remind people to recycle and we are sure that some schools will have plenty of these put up already! There is plenty underway involving the pupils to make an impact, and they will all be putting up a display in school to show the work of the Trust Council.

Weeth School have been trialling refillable glue sticks (thank you Mrs Taylor!) we have had plenty of feedback on glue.

The newest 7 schools have had their smart meters installed and we will be out to map these with the school before Christmas once there is a little more data on them. The school will then be able to map their individual energy consumption for areas of the school and make a real impact on reducing energy and costs.

Roskear and Lanner have had Solar panels installed over the summer holiday by the Estates team. The way the Trust's energy budget works means that the impact of these savings is felt across all the schools. In the first 2 months the energy saved is the equivalent to planting 74 trees.
