The children had great fun taking apart shoes using knives, scissors and saws!










Sithney School

The musicians talked about the various roles and instruments within an orchestra and how (through hours of practice), they became 'so good.'






Portreath School








Roskear School

Treloweth School





At Treloweth Primary school we are participating in a project called 'Start Small; Dream Big', linking Careers Related Learning to our whole school curriculum.

Did you know that between the ages of five to eight children form fixed ideas around careers – 'people like me can't do jobs like that' – and that by the time they are ten, this can lead to them holding stereotypes that limit their future options?

With our core values of "Curious, Kind and Connected" in mind, we launched the project with a whole school assembly introducing 2 ex- pupils and another employee from the local community: a Chief Fire Officer for Cornwall, Geothermal engineer and a Speech and Language Therapist who works for the NHS. We quizzed them on the skills and attributes they need to do their jobs.


This inspired us for our Aspirations Week where we dressed as 'My Future Self' on World Book Day- bringing in any books that depict our future role.

Spring Term



Shared Services Team News

Shared Services and Operations Update

This term I would like to highlight the hard work that Maria and Stacey in the Finance Team have done since the New Year. The volume of work these two have dealt with over the last two months has been immense due to the backlog created by the introduction of the new finance system, extra demands from the external audit last term and simply getting to grips with almost double the workload compared to this time last year. I don't often single out people or groups of people, but the work these two do due to its nature is often overlooked, but it forms the basis for so many other elements of what we do within Operations.

In February we held an Administration Training Day at Parc-Eglos so that all the school administrators could meet and discuss common issues. This year the day was based around a series of workshops with groups no larger than six meeting with each of the departments within the Shared Services Team. Based on the feedback we received this was a success as it enabled staff to ask more detailed / personalised questions to the speakers about their materials that isn't always possible in large groups. As a result, we will be looking at incorporating workshops in future events based on requested topics. Our thanks go to Caroline for organising the day and the Shared Services Team members who lead the workshops.

For the remainder of this term, we will be turning our efforts to budget setting, agreeing estates and IT projects for the busy summer period and also looking at options for the schools MIS systems, alongside the normal workload.

IT Across Crofty

In the Spring Term we have focussed on coming out to schools to talk to people about their issues and to provide training. This training has been with key individuals, at the administrator's inset day, at the Computing Teach meet and at staff meetings. If you would like to organise training at your school for Teachers or Teaching assistants, then please contact us so we can arrange a date.

During January 13 printers were installed at 7 schools meaning that all schools now have the same model printers. This means we can share resources across the Trust and should be able to reduce print costs by 20% at some of the schools due to lower per page charges. 2 more school websites have been updated into our central system leaving only 1 left to complete at the start of Summer Term. This website move means all our sites have a consistent look and feel as well as some pages being updated centrally reducing duplication of work. Our Google shared drives have now all been moved into Microsoft Teams meaning that all data is in 1 location making it easier to access for staff.

Networking works have been completed at Godolphin, Garras and Trannack to increase the speed, availability, and reliability of their networks. We have also purchased over £50k of Chromebooks and iPads for 10 schools to increase the number of devices pupils can access at the schools. In the background we have also been removing servers from schools that are no longer needed due to the cloud move and upgrading those that are still required. This should reduce our power consumption and improve our security. This will be a project that we continue into the summer term across the schools.

In the Summer term we will deliver all the new devices out to schools and be present at sites to directly help users more regularly.

Estates Team

It has been another busy term for the estates team.

The transformation of a small store cupboard into a kitchen servery at Sithney has been a hugely successful project and has also created an additional teaching and learning room.

Exciting summer project for 2024 will include:

- A new extension at Portreath school to provide two extra classrooms.
- Fire alarm upgrades at Lanner, Pennoweth and Portreath.
- External fencing at Garras and Halwin.
- Strategic kitchen upgrades across the trust.
- Toilet upgrades at Parc Eglos.
- Full boiler replacement at Sithney.

Compliance

Trust compliance is currently at 80.5 %, we now record compliance on Parago using the traffic light rating system which acts as a visual indicator of performance and helps target areas to prioritise.

We are in the process of introducing a new Asbestos portal and all the schools will have a new survey completed over the next few months. This will enable us to monitor and repair or remove any asbestos in the future.

Training compliance currently stands at Safeguarding 83.8% and Non-Safeguarding 87.1%.
