




Illogan School






Year2 - Sustainability


The Emerald children had a fantastic time at Tregullus Farm. The pupils were taught about farming in Cornwall and were invited to get up close and personal with some of the adorable animals. Of course, the highlight being the cuddles with the lambs! During the visit, the group also learnt about different habitats and had the opportunity to take part in some pond dipping where they found a variety of animals such as dragon flies, newts and tadpoles.





The Diamond class had an amazing residential trip to Carnyorth where they learnt about Cornish hedges and identified different plants and species that live in them. Once back at the centre they took part in some basket weaving using plants found in the surrounding hedgerows. On the second day, the children explored the beautiful scenic views of Botallack, searching for clues to help unravel the secrets of a once

thriving location for mining.



The first trip in the diary was an informative and inspirational tour around the local area, exploring Godolphin Woods, Godolphin House, Godolphin Hill and Great Work Mine. The tour was led by mining expert – Steve Polglase – who was keen to share his passion and enthusiasm for the local mining heritage around Godolphin. At the end of the walk, the children were invited back to Steve's workshop where he demonstrated aspects of the process of turning tin ore into tin concentrate ready to be smelted. All-in-all, the day was a huge success and helped reinforce the learning that had been taking place in the classroom. Thank you to Mr Polglase for such a memorable and enlightening day!







Trannack School

Sustainability Week

This term we had a sustainability week at Trannack! We gave some of our wider curriculum time over to thinking about the environment and how we can live and work more sustainably, and how we can begin caring for and improving the environment around us and in the wider world.

Our Godrevy class have been focusing on car production during sustainability week, comparing fossil fuel-based cars with electric cars and the impact that both can have on the environment. They have learnt about lithium production and the benefits that battery power brings, as well as some of the problems that these batteries can cause.

We finished off our week with a BIG debate to try to answer the question, 'Should electric cars be part of our journey towards a greener future'



In Portreath class we have been learning about water pollution, focusing on the rivers of the UK. Children have talked about how water is filtered to make it safe to use and countries around the world that don't have that luxury. We have created information posters about water pollution, created our own water filters and described the process of filtration. We are going to continue our learning by studying the local 'Red river' and writing a report on its history. The children in Portreath have been shocked by some of the facts and figures we have discovered this week.

Our Praa Sands class helped to rescue some sea animals trapped in rubbish that had been washed into our classroom. We will be thinking about the question "What would it be like if there were no plants or animals in the sea?"

After the action-packed morning, the children enjoyed lunch and a play on the beach before returning to school.






Portreath School

Operations Update

As you will see from the various Team reports there has been lots going on this term and there are plans for much more over the Summer holiday period.

On this occasion I would like to highlight the work the Estates and ICT Teams have completed this term and the vast amount of work they will do over the summer, whilst the pupils and school staff are on leave. The Summer holiday represents the key opportunity when jobs can get done, so for both of these teams, as always it will be a busy period.

The Estates Team once again has a full agenda and will be completing tasks over a number of schools this Summer, but I would like to take this chance to highlight why they are such a key resource for the Trust. Early in the term we had a serious flood at Pennoweth School. Due to the swift actions of the Estates Team they were able to restrict the damage caused, make the rooms impacted fit for purpose in quick time and also continue to complete the work required to secure the insurance income required to make good. It is this type of event that really highlights the strength that a Trust can offer to each of our schools.

Over the summer the ICT Team will be working to make significant network upgrades to two of the Trusts schools. Networking is often overlooked when it comes to investment, but without a strong network, however new the equipment is it will not function to its full potential. I would also like to highlight the results from the recent staff survey which including a number of very encouraging comments about the work that both Martin and Phil do in the schools. It is evident from the feedback that they make a real impact.

I was also heartened to see that the feedback from the recent staff review would indicate that changes the Shared Services Team have made over the last few terms are going down well with the school Administrators. Although we have work to do it would appear that the joint training days are really appreciated, not only for the training/updates provided, but they also represent a chance for Administrators to establishment working relationships with people in other schools.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the part Caroline Thomas has played over the last nine years to establish Crofty Education Trust. As I suspect you all know by now, Caroline at the end of this term will be leaving to take up a new role at Flushing School. Caroline is one of a kind, kind being the key word! Her thoughtfulness, experience and exceptional attitude to the workplace will be greatly missed. But the call of working in a school, working closer to the pupils was ultimately too much of a draw for Caroline. I know all of us would have benefitted from Caroline's input at some point in the past and in turn would wish her all the best the future.

IT Across Crofty

In the Summer Term we have configured and installed over 100 iPads in 11 schools as well as installing Interactive screens in 4 more schools. We have tried to be a more regular presence at schools to help staff with any issues they are having and to catch those jobs that are only remembered when you see one of us.

We have used the Summer Term to trial new interactive screens and Safeguarding monitoring systems. We want to ensure that we are still using the most suitable interactive screens as new models are being developed and released regularly. We are trialling Safeguarding monitoring systems at several schools to see if we can add this to our current filtering systems to improve our pupils safeguarding in line with Keeping Children Safe in Education.

Outside of this we have been continuing with several of our long-term projects. This has included upgrading and removing further servers from schools to increase our security and reduce our energy usage. All school websites are now in the new template, and we are starting to look at creating an Intranet that we will us for improved sharing of information internally.

As we move towards the summer holidays, we have been getting quotes together to fully upgrade the network infrastructure at 2 of our schools to bring them more up to date. We will also be looking at further integrating our systems across the Trust to make management of accounts and devices easier. We are going to create a Crofty Wide Wireless system so all devices will connect to a single network at all schools for increased mobility.

Estates Team

It has been another busy term for the estates team.

Pennoweth school has recently been flooded causing over thirty thousand pounds worth of damage when a mains water pipe burst. The Estates team, alongside Richfords Fire and Flood worked throughout the night to ensure that no teaching and learning time was lost. After a period of drying, new carpets have been laid and the remaining remedial works to the hall will be carried out during the summer holidays.







Porthleven

Two classrooms at Porthleven have recently been renovated, this included creating a new doorway to incorporate the toilets into the classrooms.









Projects the Estate team are currently working on include:

Portreath - two new classroom build.

Halwin - external walls and classroom refurbishment.

Trannack - hall and classroom refurbishment.

Parc Eglos - toilet upgrades.

Sithney - new main boiler and associated works.

Godolphin -updating the main corridor.

Strategic kitchen upgrades across the trust.







Finance (inc. Audit) Update

The Finance Team continue to squirrel away in the background, introducing and refining more systems which help the smooth running of the Access Software based on feedback. Efforts have moved to income this term with systems introduced to support direct payments and over the Summer work is planned to develop and make more use of ParentPay.

This term we have had an Internal Audit visit to review Safeguarding and Whistleblowing. Internal Audit is part of the Trusts risk reduction strategy and is the one of the tools used by the Trustees to ensure what we say we are doing is actually delivered. Thank you for those members of staff who were asked to take part in this audit, the findings will be published next week and if there are lessons to be learnt this will be acted upon as appropriate. We have a further Internal Audit which will be checking Purchase to Pay at the end of July. We also engaged the services of a new External Auditor, Wescotts who will be working with the Trust to complete both the Annual Audit and Annual Accounts during the Autumn term.

From September with Caroline moving to pastures new, payroll will come under the control of the Finance Team, with myself taking the lead, further details will follow next term. To reassure you all I have held a very similar position in another Trust recently and in turn have years of previous payroll experience both within schools and the private sector.
